

1st Birthday

A public event to celebrate the first year of Stories in Stone was held on 1 April at the Victoria Hall in Settle. The event aimed to promote the scheme, let people see what's been done so far and what's planned for this year, and find out about the opportunities to get involved

Sixteen project partners had information stalls, kids activities were provided, and short talks about several of the projects were given. The drop-in event ran from 10am to 3.30pm and almost 200 people popped in over the course of the day.

At midday the birthday cake was cut by Dave Tayler, YDMT's deputy director, and a slice was given to anyone who wanted one.

We were very pleased with how the day went and we got a lot of positive feedback from partners and attendees, including "I had an excellent day. Ribblehead to Selside








gleborough Walks

Prince Charles called into Chapel le Dale in March to meet the Stories in Stone rural trainees, whose posts are being part-funded by the Prince's Countryside Fund. The traineeships aim to help young people to develop careers in land management and conservation. He first met Chloë Lumsdon, our trainee based with Natural England at the Ingleborough National Nature Reserve, who was helping youngsters from Bentham Community Primary School to plant wildflower plugs into a meadow undergoing restoration. Then he met Tom Hickey and Liam Johnson, apprentices based with the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority, who were carrying out repairs to a stretch of dry stone walling.

Heritage Grants

Grants of between £200 and £5,000 are available for projects that conserve, enhance, celebrate or increase understanding of the historical and natural landscape of the Ingleborough Dales area. So far we've funded the restoration of a historic packhorse bridge and Victorian drinking fountain, a series of walk leaflets with a focus on Ingleborough's archaeology (mentioned above), and an interpretation panel for a wash dub. The next deadline for applications is 27 June.
